Today Hopi Department of Transportation (HDOT) and the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) as well as other Partnership Steering Committee members met at the ADOT Training Facility in Flagstaff. The 14 attendees were from HDOT, Hopi Tribe, ADOT, Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Northern Arizona Council of Governments (NACOG) and Navajo County. The meeting opened with a prayer, facility safety and committee member introductions.

The members discussed action items identified at the March 20, 2019 meeting held in Kykotsmovi Village. There were four (4) specific goals which were reported on by HDOT and other accountable parties. Each goal report included a status report, action items, challenges and possible solutions.

1. Identify a maintenance facility location on the Hopi Reservation:

HDOT is currently in need of a maintenance facility to house both personnel and equipment. At this time, administrative staff is located in the Kykotsmovi office and road maintenance staff is located in Keams Canyon. HDOT would like to find a location within District 6 due to favorable infrastructure and available utilities. HDOT is looking for clan/village leader, documented approval. Michael Lomayaktewa, HDOT Director, gave the group an update of location details, features, available infrastructure and current communications with community members as noted below.

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There were no new locations to consider. HDOT has a funding source if an available location is identified. Other challenges identified when considering a location are distance (Peabody Coal Mine area is very far in distance), scattered personnel and equipment, social and political influences, clans often have ownership of the land, zoning restrictions or lack of zoning and Hopi Ordinance 55 which imparts additional environmental considerations.

Navajo County can provide site topo mapping and assist with environmental clearances on identified locations. Bill Bess, Navajo County Engineer, is the contact.

2. State Route 264:

State Route (SR) 264 traverses most of the villages on the Hopi Reservation covering approximately 50 miles. The road terrain is hilly, with many curves. A Road Safety Audit (RSA) revealed numerous fatalities and overall lack of law enforcement on this stretch of road. There are minimal shoulders. The pavement is in poor condition with significant surface deterioration. This road becomes very heavily traveled with tourist and commercial vehicles when SR 89 or Interstate 40 is shut down. In pull outs along the road, school buses are getting stuck and there have been reports of pedestrian and vehicle near misses along the bus stops.

3. Reduce heavy traffic on SR 87:

SR 87 runs north from I-40, through the Navajo Indian Reservation and approximately the last 18 miles is located on the Hopi Reservation. This stretch of road is at a lower elevation, has a straighter alignment and the pavement is in better condition than SR 264. HDOT would like to improve the communications between HDOT and ADOT Keams Canyon Maintenance facility. HDOT is concerned with commercial truck traffic, specifically over-size/over-weight (OS/OW) vehicles trying to avoid enforcement regulations. ADOT staff is working with Enforcement Compliance Division (ECD) on setting up temporary mobile weigh stations. Hopi Tribe has conducted a Road Safety Audit on SR 87. Hopi, working through NACOG will complete a street light project at SR 87 and the Hopi Cultural Center.

4. Recruit staff to gather data and establish a safety program :

HDOT's goal for 2019 is to recruit a staff member to gather data and establish a safety program. Crash data is necessary when applying for some funding sources, specifically Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funds.

This goal has been met for 2019. Michael L. will keep the team updated on the next steps towards adopting TrACS and the use of the software.

Parking Lot of Ideas & Questions:

These items were discussed at the meeting and were not part of the agenda. They may be considered future talking points or agenda items at the discretion of the HDOT director or steering committee member.

- Donovan Gomez, Transit Administrator, Hopi Senom Transit: Community Transportation Association of America (CTAA) provides planning assistance. There has been an increase in transit need but a reduction in funding to the tribe. Mr. Gomez has submitted a USDA Rural Passenger Technical Assistance Grant to improve transportation services and economic development to the tribe.
- Closing of Peabody Mine, Cholla Power Plant and the Navajo Generating Station: The committee discussed several impacts including a reduction in sales tax collected, increased transit demands to relocate workers and Navajo County has had financial impacts to the County General Fund.
- Navajo County Sheriff Patrol: Deputy Simonson, who resides in Pinion, has been assigned to patrol on "tribal lands" and assist as needed the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Navajo County law enforcement and Hopi law enforcement.
- Committee members suggested inviting other agencies including Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), Department of Public Safety (DPS) and ADOT ROW Specialist, Elisabett Vargas.
 BIA is represented by Wendell Honanie, BIA Hopi Agency, but was not present at today's meeting.
 I do have a contact for DPS if you would like me to include them in future meeting invites.
 I will defer to the committee members as to further guidance of adding people to the invitation list.
